In April, the Board of Trustees discussed several exciting ideas about the future (2025-2027 and then to 2030) for the congregation.

We invite you to a Board Town Hall meeting on May 4 after Sunday service. We will provide updates on what we have been thinking about these last few months since investigating (and turning down) the chance of acquiring the large piece of land behind us.

This came out of the on-going work of our Property Committee, which in partnership with HSSI is moving cautiously towards the idea of a Capital Campaign and a push to build a large multi-purpose building on our interfaith campus. Representatives from HSSI will join us at the May 4 th Town Hall meeting. Please give them a warm welcome.

Our Stewardship and Membership Committee is enthusiastically coming up with creative ways for us to easily contribute resources, including a possible new approach to the annual fundraising auction. Stay tuned! The Finance Committee is taking a deep dive into our various board policies and guidance documents to ensure that we go forward with confidence from year to year meeting our obligations. This includes our administrative responsibilities towards staff, our insurance coverage, and our relationship with the UUA.

We happily welcomed David Windley back to our monthly in-person Board of Trustees meetings. He has been attending them via Zoom these past several months while in Florida with Anne.

Dick Boyce and I met with the Building and Grounds team early in April (between storms) to talk about the condition of the building and what might need maintenance very soon. We also inspected mysterious wheel ruts in the backyard while taking a walk-about.

Music at UUCCI:

SONGS AS POLITICAL WEAPONS

In the 1953 film "The Wild One," Hoosier native James Dean plays a rebellious biker named Johnnie. When someone asks him, "What are you rebelling against, Johnnie?" he famously replies, "Whaddaya got?"

Today, if someone asks, "What you are protesting?" there are so many causes, it's hard to know where to start. Music plays a vital role in protest movements. While words can stir our brains, music can stir our hearts and focus our energies. This was true in the Revolutionary War days of "Yankee Doodle," although other Revolutionary songs are not so well known today.

From the beginnings of slavery through the Civil War, African American spirituals were composed by enslaved persons expressing Christian teachings in the context of slavery, such as "Go Down, Moses," "Nobody Knows the Trouble I've Seen," "Steal Away," "Swing Low, Sweet chariot," "Michael, Row the Boat Ashore," "No More Auction Block for Me," and many more.

Opposing sides in the War Between the States were aroused by "Mine Eyes have Seen the Glory of the Coming of the Lord (Battle Hymn of the Republic)" or "I wish I was in the land of cotton (Dixie)." Both sides could shed a tear to the tunes of "Tramp, Tramp, Tramp, the Boys are Marching" and "Tenting on the Old Camp Ground" or "When Johnny Comes Marching Home Again."



In the 1950s, 60s, and 70s, fervent sentiments found expression in "We Shall Overcome" "Oh Freedom," "We Shall Not Be Moved," "Ain't Gonna Let Nobody Turn Me Round" and "Blowin' in the Wind," and "A Change is Gonna Come." In the same era, another group of Americans responded to "An Okie from Muskogee," "God Bless the U. S. A.," and "The Ballad of the Green Beret," as Americans fought each other in the streets and in homes across the country.

If thinking about these songs stirs your feelings, then you can understand why songs are sung to arouse and unify crowds at today's protest demonstrations.




