

The Flower Ceremony, sometimes referred to as Flower Communion or Flower Festival, is an annual ritual that celebrates beauty, human uniqueness, diversity, and community. Originally created in 1923 by Unitarian minister Norbert Čapek of Prague, Czechoslovakia, the Flower Ceremony was introduced to the United States by Rev. Mája Čapek, Norbert's widow. In this ceremony, everyone in the congregation brings a flower. Each person places a flower on the altar or in a shared vase. The congregation and minister bless the flowers, and they're redistributed. Each person brings home a different flower than the one they brought.

LETTER FROM THE MINISTER

DEAR MEMBERS AND FRIENDS OF UUCCI,

Throughout May I have spent time nesting once more into community with all of you. I have enjoyed time catching up whether over coffee, lunch, a walk, or at UUCCI. Hearing your stories of the sabbatical and learning about new things going on in your lives, I am thankful again and again to be able to walk along side you on this journey.

For this first newsletter since we have returned to one another after our respective sabbatical journeys, I wanted to write about the power of our stories. Our stories, each of your stories, contain truth and meaning, they importance, and they are worthy of sharing in community. Sometimes, we take for granted the meaningfulness that is our very existence. We look for truth beyond ourselves, authority beyond ourselves, and as a result we neglect noticing the beauty of our own journeys. From the mundane to the extraordinary, your life journey and your moral and ethical pursuits hold wisdom that others would benefit from hearing. When we share our stories, we can find greater connection, meaning, and direction for our lives.

This is why I have been thinking a lot over the past few months while on sabbatical about not whether we should share our stories in community, but "how" we can do so in a way that is accessible and transformational for those sharing the stories and those receiving them.

Long before I came to serve as minister of UUCCI, a tradition existed to occasionally have members of the congregation share their "Spiritual Journey". Essentially, this was an opportunity to hear about the spiritual and ethical, human journey we have been undertaking both at UUCCI and prior to coming to this community. I know that these services hold a lot of meaning for you, just as the reflections done by congregants each Sunday has been impactful. And I have wondered how to best support this sharing of stories. In July 2018, we began to devote an entire month to Sharing Our Stories and we have done so every July since. This will be the sixth year of our Spiritual Journey series, yet the journey itself has witnessed major changes within our community. Most notably, the pandemic and sabbatical have really shifted how we have been able to connect and how to effectively use technology to enhance our sharing. For example, July of 2018 and 2019 looked a lot different than 2020-2022 due to the technology and mediums in which we were able to gather and present our stories during the pandemic.

In 2023, now certainly beyond the pandemic, I want to explore a third way of honoring this important tradition in our congregational life. This will honor both the intimacy of live services and the enhancement and perpetuity that technology can offer through prerecorded elements. This is what I envision:

- 1. Sharing Our Stories or some language very similar will be the new framework for the services in July. Spiritual Journeys elicits both an overemphasis on the spirituality of our lives and the linear or autobiographical nature of our journeys. By reframing to Sharing Our Stories, we can better emphasize that we all have wisdom and stories worth sharing in community. This may result in focusing on a particular aspect of one's life, or chapter in life, or a central theme one notices reoccurring throughout their life. Certainly, the services can still take on autobiographical nature, but the diversity of approaches likely creates more clarity of the central importance of telling our stories in community.
- 2. Live and Pre-Recorded Elements will be utilized to create the best of both worlds of direct human experience on Sunday morning and the beauty technology can bring to our congregational life. The service will still be truncated likely consisting of 1) a live Welcome, Opening Words, and Chalice Lighting; 2) transitioning to pre-recorded elements, Opening Music w/ Pictures of the storytellers life, Reading(s), Sharing Our Stories, Closing Music; and finally, 3) some type of interactive ending, such as closing words, a facilitated Q/A, or a group conversation.
- 3. Fellowship Hall will be the location for these services, gathering folks around tables to experience the "service" with a more coffee house environment. Projection on the west wall, like what was done for Ann Herron's Celebration of Life will create a more intimate, rather than cavernous, experience for the pre-recorded elements of the service. This will also create a different, more dynamic energy for the July series that I believe will foster deeper connection in our community.

Of course all of this is experimentation and I hope you will help as we lean in to our attempt to lift up and share our stories with greater intention. We all have stories worth sharing! With your help, our tradition of doing so will meet the era of community possibility before us. Take a sneak peek look at whose stories are coming this fall!

Then, while we're in an old-fashioned mood, we will gather indoors or outdoors, according to the weather, for a summer picnic. Watch your Friday Reminder for details.






THE BLESSING OF BOREDOM
